Dr. Ray Gosine,

In keeping with the beliefs of the Indigenous peoples, we are merely stewards of this planet.

Being a steward involves taking responsibility to sustain and care for Mother Earth; however, as environmental stewards, we are despoiling the earth, endangering the very existence of all life, merely to satisfy our own selfish desires.
